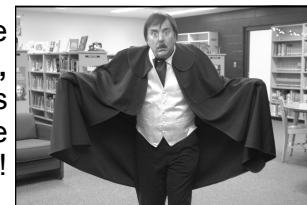

EDGAR ALLAN POE VISITS LIBRARY

Join us for a visit with Edgar Allan Poe portrayed by George Bartley, **Tuesday, April 26 at 6:30pm.** The presentation is free, open to the public, and made possible through the History Alive! program of the WV Humanities Council.



The presentation interweaves many of the tragic events of Poe's life with some of his greatest works. Special emphasis is given to Poe's fascinating connections to WV.

While perhaps best known for his tales of terror, Poe also wrote "The Raven"- the most famous poem ever written by an American and "Annabel Lee." Often referred to as "America's Shakespeare," Poe also wrote the first detective story and the first modern science fiction story.

May is GET CAUGHT READING Month

Thanks to all who filled out our survey this winter. We received 533 responses from a mailing to some 4,000 households. There were many positive comments and ratings about our collection, services and staff. Some suggestions were: to improve the book and audio collection with more patron input, have a longer checkout for DVDs, a fine-free day each week, Sunday hours again, multiple copies of new releases, chairs without arms for the reading area, make sure overdue books that are requested are returned sooner, have more adult programs at night, do not replace classic movies with Disney versions, some staff members to be more cheerful. Some people are not aware of our many services, such as notary public or study rooms. Most people came to borrow books and DVDs. We will consider many of the comments and work to improve our services and make them better known. We will have newsletters and calendars available at the library, online and through a mailing list. If you are interested in a mailed newsletter, please let us know. Again, thanks for your suggestions. Your comments are always welcome.

We apologize for the inconvenience of the long walk to the library's River Rd. entrance that you had to make during a cold, windy and wet winter.
